He also noted that Chick had requested that consideration of the Planning Commission Survey be postponed until The Planning Commission has had a chance to consider this. Engstrom asked that authorization of a settlement discussed in an attorney-client privileged communication be added.

## FIRST CALL TO THE PUBLIC

Mike Cicchella, 7789 Sutton Road, spoke in opposition to the Township spending money on planning issues and a meeting room, likening it to bad decisions made before he served as Supervisor that endangered the Township's financial condition.

David Gordon, 5558 Hellner Road, made a suggestion for improving communications between public officials and

the public. He also said the premise of a consultant's proposal to conduct a citizen survey in the Township is false.

Craig Warburton, 450 West Joy Road, said it is clear no discussion of amending the Master Plan would have happened without a request from a developer which would go into the prettiest part of the Township near protected lands. He asked the Board to stop these plans.

James Gordinier, 6690 Earhart Road, said a natural retention pond in the area was filled in by the Wildwood Meadow developer resulting in serious flooding. He said the proposal for a special assessment district would cost him at least \$25,000, and the Township would be charged \$106,000 for this man-made problem.

## BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS

Dockett said he agrees the Township should not be spending money on a Board meeting room.

## REPORTS

### Department Heads

*Wastewater Treatment Plant.* Hardesty referred to his March report.

*Police.* Chief Wagner read the summary of the March report and updated the conditions of two officers injured at the Pond Hockey Tournament, noting that one will be off-duty following surgery for most of the year and that will impact the department's budget.

*Fire.* Chief Wagner read the summary of the March report and relayed a proposal from Salem Township to share the cost of two warning sirens.

*Treasurer.* Braun referred to the revenue and expenditure reports, and reports showing taxes transmitted to the County and taxes remaining unpaid.

*Community Center.* Averill referred to her written report. She said 24 people are signed up for lunches at the center, and plans are continuing to start Meals on Wheels in June.

*Manager.* Fink referred to his written report. In answer to a question from Dockett, Fink explained that the Washtenaw Area Transportation Study (WATS) Technical Committee recommended approval of the US-23 project, and the Policy Committee votes tomorrow.

## Other

*Planning Commission.* No report.

*Zoning Board of Appeals.* Otto reported that on March 30<sup>th</sup> the ZBA approved variances for projects on Lakeshore Drive and Five Mile Road.

**AGENDA ITEMS**

**Earhart Road  
Drainage Special Assessment District**

Fink reported the Township filed an appeal to reserve the right of the Board to decide how to respond to a \$106,000 draining assessment, but an initial \$650 bond requirement was increased to \$25,000 with very little notice, the Township could not file on time, and the Probate Court rejected its appeal to accept the bond late. He said an appeal of that decision could be filed.

Dennis Wojcik, Deputy Water Resources Commissioner for Washtenaw County, made a presentation showing that the natural drain in this area was blocked a former natural detention area being filled and by construction of a house. He said prior to a massive flood in 2011—which closed Earhart Road for 10 days and prevented residents of Wild Meadows Circle from getting to their homes—he had advised other residents of the area to work with the owner of that house to install a drainage pipe, but they were not successful. He said as a result of the flood residents started the petition process in 2011.

Wojcik explained that there were higher-than usual engineering and easement condemnation costs for this project, and 51% of the benefit and cost of the project was assigned to Northfield Township. In answer to another question from Dockett, Wojcik said maintenance of the drain is paid for by the property owners.

Dockett said more of the cost should be assigned to the people who changed the drainage. Wojcik said he does not disagree, but the assessment cannot be legally structured that way. In answer to questions from Engstrom, Wojcik said no action has been taken against the parties who changed the drainage pattern, and the house was built in about 2005. Otto said the Township must have issued building permits for the house.

Fink said Burns believes legal action in the Probate Court is possible to appeal the Township's assessment, but, if successful, that would shift the cost to the homeowners in the area. Otto asked if more fill can be legally prevented by the Township. Fink said the area was determined to not be a regulated wetland, but the developer still needed a fill permit that they did not seek.

Burns said the question is whether the Drain Commissioner, Evan Pratt, will agree to re-open the apportionment hearing. Pratt said this type of thing happens frequently, and case law supports a suit against a neighbor that changes drainage, but neighbors did not do that in this case.

James Gordinier said only 10 people signed the petition and they own the smallest parcels in the district so will pay the least.

Pratt said if he is legally allowed to do so he would consider re-opening the apportionment hearing, but questioned how the outcome could be improved. Fink said he needs to have a discussion with the County Board of Trustees about this. Burns said at least an opportunity to stay the process would be appreciated so the Township has time to consider the issue. Pratt said he is willing to do what is legally allowed.

- ▶ **Motion:** Thomas moved, Otto supported, to authorize Paul Burns to either pursue an appeal of the Probate Court's denial of the acceptance of a bond, and/or use any other legal proceedings, including any appellate rights to preserve the Township's rights going forward, and to authorize Burns to engage in a negotiated order or agreement with the County that would allow proceedings to be stayed and not proceed further while the Board can get more information  
**Motion carried 6—0 on a voice vote.**

The Board agreed Fink should take this issue to the County Board.

**Washtenaw County Road Commission Projects**

- ▶ **Motion:** Otto moved, Thomas supported, that \$120,000 be approved for road improvements as outlined in Fink's memo, with the \$9,004.36 difference between the projects listed being included for miscellaneous approved road improvements, and authorizing the Township Manager to sign the road project contract.  
**Motion carried 6—0 on a voice vote.**

**Wastewater Treatment Plant Request

**Board Room Construction: Construction Manager**

Thomas said given the news about the potential cost to the Township of the Earhart Road Special Drainage Assessment District it is unclear whether the Township will be able to afford this project.

- ▶ **Motion:** Thomas moved, Dockett supported, that the Board Room Construction Project be tabled indefinitely. **Motion carried 6—0 on a voice vote.**

8. **Planning Commission Survey**

Removed from the agenda.

9.  
**Authorization of Settlement**

- ▶ **Motion:** Engstrom moved, Braun supported, to authorize settlement as set forth in the attorney-client privileged communication in the Nowatzke matter.

Dockett said he wants it on the record that three Nowatzke L.L.C.s owe the Township \$25,000 for sewer service, and Nowatzke wants to settle for 50% of that, but he does not support that. He asked for a roll call vote.

**Motion carried 4—2 on a roll call vote, Dockett and Thomas opposed.**

10.  
**BMX Park**

Thomas explained that the Parks & Recreation Committee has been working on development of a BMX (bicycle motocross) park next to the Bark Park, and the school district seems amenable. He said this would probably require a \$2,000 contribution per year for increased insurance premiums and maintenance of the facility. He asked for a consensus of the Board about this. Dockett

said he would like to see a park that serves everyone, not just dog owners and bike racers. Thomas said the Committee is also working on that. Other Board members indicated support.

**SECOND CALL TO THE PUBLIC**

**Earhart Road Drainage Special Assessment District.** Mary Devlin, 9211 Brookside Drive, and Chuck Steuer, 760 Six Mile Road, asked whether legal action against the property owner who caused the problem could be filed, or if a class action suit could be initiated.

**Township Finances.** David Gordon, 5558 Hellner Road, supported delaying the meeting room construction, and questioned whether it would be legal under one of the two bonds used for construction the Public Safety Building two rent out the second floor of the building.

**Northfield Neighbors.** Jim Nelson, 7777 Sutton Road, listed items related to Township government available on the website [www.northfieldneighbors.today](http://www.northfieldneighbors.today).

**BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS**

**Millages.** Dockett commented on the cost to taxpayers for the Township's millages and said he will vote no on the May ballot millage proposal.

**Road Improvements.** Thomas noted the Board spent quite a bit of time at the last Board workshop discussing the County Road Commission projects approved earlier in the meeting.

**Bonds/Building Rental.** Fink said he has looked into the issue of renting out the second floor of the Public Safety Building and welcomed ideas for legally doing this to a governmental or non-profit entity, but knows of no legal opinion that would allow other rentals.

**FIRST CALL TO THE PUBLIC**

Mary Devlin, 9211 Brookside, thanked Averill and those at the Senior Center, and made comments about Proposal 1 regarding road funding and sales tax. Dale Brewer, 11548 East Shore Drive, made comments about the sewer capacity report and the Whitmore Lake sewer assessment district. David Gordon, 5558 Hellner Road, made comments on Township spending related to growth: for sewer repairs and expansion, Public Safety Building lighting and a meeting room, and local road maintenance.

**BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS**

Dockett said he will be voting against State Proposal 1 because it will raise sales tax forever. He also agreed that the Whitmore Lake Sewer district should not be delayed any further. Fink said a critical easement is required for this project and he anticipates that will be signed this Friday which will allow the project to move forward.

**CORRESPONDENCE & ANNOUNCEMENTS**

Fink reported that the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) has indicated that if the Washtenaw Area Transportation Study (WATS) advisory committee does not approve the Active Transportation Management (ATM) part of the US-23 project (additional lanes to be used during heavy traffic periods) MDOT will pull the \$60 million of the \$80 million designated for that part of the project and use it for other projects in the state. Dockett said if that happens the Township should not pay any more dues to WATS.

**DISCUSSION ITEMS**

**1.**

**Annual Report from  
Washtenaw County Road Commission (WCRC)**

Roy Townsend, Managing Director of the WCRC reviewed the written report and noted that the 2015 matching program will provide \$25,000 for road projects and about \$13,700 for drainage management projects in Northfield Township. He noted the Township needs to inform the WCRC by May 22<sup>nd</sup> how they would like these funds spent.

WCRC Foreman Mike Mastie reviewed proposed local road projects, including those involving shared costs with neighboring townships. Fink said Township roads are in better condition this year than last so perhaps the best approach is to use funding for limestone on various roads. Townsend noted North Territorial from Spencer and Earhart will be rebuilt starting in May or June using the .5 mill raised by the County Board using Public Act 283.

Otto said the County needs to maintain ditches better to protect the investment made in creating them. Dockett said the WCRC needs to better supervise the work done by subcontractors.

**2.**

**Sewer Capacity Study Presentation**

Township Engineer Brian Rubel of Tetra Tech reviewed the capacity study and said:

- This is a very concise evaluation of commitments the Township has made regarding sewers, not a master plan.
- Northfield Township has two agreements with Green Oak Township: A 2001 agreement for 124 Residential Equivalent Units (REUs) on the north side of Whitmore Lake (about 20 of which have been added since then), and a 2004 agreement to provide 200,000 gallons/day

for an area around Silver Lake Road. The total of these is 873 REUs or 227,000 gallons/days.

- The Township has commitments to four special assessment districts (SADs): Lake Point, North Territorial, Seven Mile Road, and Whitmore Lake Road, and the remaining commitment in excess of those that have already hooked up is 1,865 REUs and an additional 485,000 gallons/day.
- The total remaining commitment for capacity to Green Oak Township and the four SADs is 2,738 REUs and 700,000 gallons/day.
- A 2002 agreement rescinded a prior commitment to Hamburg Township.
- Because water gets into the system for 100-200 hours per year, building storage allows the excess at those times to be treated later over a longer period of time.
- The current capacity of—and the State permit for—the WWTP plant is 1.3 million gallons/day (MGD), and if storage during wet times were available the capacity could be increased to 1.5 MGD. The State requires that when treatment reaches 85% of capacity—which would be 1.1 MGD for the WWTP today—additional capacity must be built or storage must be provided.
- The current 365 day average being treated is .7 MGD, but in the spring it is closer to .9 MGD, so an additional .2 MGD or 800 REUS could be handled without additional storage or .4 MGD or 1500 REUS with building additional storage.
- A 2002 Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) policy requires sewer systems to handle a 3.9" storm in one day, which means Northfield Township's WWTP would have to build 1.7 million gallons of storage for its current operations and to serve for many additional years.
- Storage could be above or below ground, could be made of steel or concrete, and would require upgrades to pumps.
- It has been challenging for the WWTP plant to handle peak flows, so the storage tanks would be useful immediately and may be necessary after another 200 or so REUs are added.
- With only 800-1500 REUs available before capacity must be increased, but having commitments for an additional 2,738 REUs, the Board needs to consider what its policy will be regarding proposals for additional growth in the Township.
- Next steps include investigating financing for the tank and considering increasing connection fees to cover this cost.

Fink noted the vast majority of the capacity already committed in Northfield Township is in the North Territorial SAD, but that area may not develop fully for decades, so the question is whether all or some of the capacity for that development should be reserved or whether it could be used by developments in other areas. He said there is no right or wrong answer to this, but if the Board were to decide that WWTP capacity should be reserved for all of the commitments, that would mean implementing a development moratorium until the plant

capacity is increased. He said what is done in other communities can be looked at for guidance.

Rubel said Saline is facing this same issue, and they are considering providing service to new development beyond their current commitments, and would use the connection fees toward future plant expansion.

In answer to questions, Fink and Rubel said:

- There is no end date for the commitments to Green Oak Township.
- Land is available to expand the WWTP.
- Advantages of above-ground tanks include easier inspection and maintenance.
- If a storage tank were built today but not used for five years it would still have great value at that time.

**3.  
Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) Request for  
Rebuild of Tertiary Sand Filters**

Wastewater Treatment Plant Superintendent Hardesty said the tertiary sand filters are at the end of their life, and while it will be expensive, the Controller confirms funds are available. He asked that this project be put in the next fiscal year's budget. Dockett said he will not support a project without other bids being sought.

**4.  
Board Room Construction:  
Construction Manager Quotes**

Fink referred to three quotes provided for construction management for the board room project. He recommended using DeMattia Construction LLC because of their experience with small projects of this type, and said his second choice would be Shaw Construction. Dockett noted the third bidder indicates they will not be available this spring so there are actually only two bids.

In answer to questions from Otto and Dockett, Fink said a \$150,000 estimate has been given for the project, but he thinks it can be closer to \$100,000. He explained that the construction manager method is more transparent than using a general contractor, and the actual cost cannot be known until a construction manager is hired and bids are requested.

It was agreed additional information should be presented at the next workshop meeting.

**5.  
Code Enforcement Contract Renewal**

In answer to questions, Fink said the contract provided is unchanged from the once currently being used. He referred to his memo and said the Board needs to set code enforcement priorities, and once that is done enforcement would be done without bringing individual cases to the Board. Otto said serious cases of blight are most important

to her. Fink said that is what Lenaghan has been focusing on. Dockett said the Township should leave people alone. Braun said Lenaghan's work probably follows the complaints he receives. Fink said that is exactly right and gave a couple examples.

Otto suggested that Lenaghan be scheduled to have Lenaghan present information at the next Board workshop session about the work he has been doing without providing details about the people or property owners involved. Dockett said the Board and the public should be given details. Fink said that would not be appropriate.

David Gordon expressed concern about the expenses the Township would incur to build a sewer retention tank and/or to expand the wastewater treatment plant if development is allowed outside the areas where sewer service commitments already exists. He also objected to spending money on construction of a Board meeting room.

**BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS**

Dockett said he is not in favor of spending money on a Board room, and he encouraged voters to reject Proposal A on the May ballot. Otto announced two Kiwanis events: an Easter egg hunt on April 4<sup>th</sup>, and a pancake breakfast on April 25<sup>th</sup> to support the 4<sup>th</sup> of July events.

Engstrom adjourned the meeting at 9:45 P.M.

- Foundation for infrastructure (sewers)

Lower priorities:

- Administrative
- Consolidation of government services
- Regulatory priorities
- Maintaining existing facilities (e.g. Public Safety parking lot)
- Making sure the necessary infrastructure is in place—utilities, administration, etc.
- Review Police and Fire

## PRIORITIZING/ GOAL RELATED PROJECTS/ ACTION ITEMS

### Develop appropriate fiscal priorities

The Board discussed how \$400-500K (the balance in excess of 85% of annual expenditures) could be spent:

\* Township has little debt, and debt that is bonded has a prepayment penalty. The Township can, however, give money to the Fire Department to pay down its debt on their fire truck.

\*\* Millions could be spent. It would be good to have all main roads paved because they are cheaper to maintain than dirt roads. There is no funding available from the State; Michigan is 50<sup>th</sup> of 50 states in road funding. Going to the Road Commission with \$1M in funding from a millage changes the conversation. Consider creating a Roads Reserve

\*\*\* Should be in the budget each year. Will be an action item.

\*\*\*\* Currently in legal review.

@ The Township probably cannot give money to the public schools or do work on their behalf.

### Framing the development debate more concretely and specifically

Fink cautioned that the Planning Commission needs to allow the Planning Commission to operate as an independent body, and whatever they send to the Board the Board can adopt or not. However, it is totally appropriate for the Board to say it wants the Commission to work on certain things, e.g. reviewing the Master Plan, revising zoning districts, without giving instructions about specifics.

The Board discussed zoning and development mechanisms and pressures in general.

A member of the public asked what the goal of more development is. Responses included:

- It is not clear whether residential development pays for itself or not, but it probably is at the bottom of the list of net positive tax producers. However, people create the demand for uses that do become a significant net positive.

- More residential and shopping opportunities for the people who are already here are desired.
- The Township is too spread out; it would bring people together.
- We want to remain Northfield Township while being more desirable.
- There is a sense that rather than just staying the same we are losing ground in desirability, housing values, etc., while areas around are doing better.
- When residents become successful and want to buy a more expensive house they move out of the Township. (Brain drain).

Action items:

- Do a legal analysis of the master plan amendment request.
- Prepare a land conditions map showing large percable parcels.
- Research models of good development following community disagreements about growth.

- Consider allocating funds for a full review of the Master Plan.

It was also agreed to consider making the Deputy Clerk a full-time position.

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The last step of our treatment process is the Tertiary Sand Filters. The sewage passes down thru the sand and then thru what are called porous plates. These plates are starting to break down and become encrusted not allowing the sewage to pass thru them as they should. Sand is also passing thru or around the plates in numerous areas. We need to have these rebuilt in July and August when our flow is at its' lowest. There are two tanks 40 feet long by 9 feet wide which will be rebuilt one at a time and take about 3 weeks per tank. It will also take 8 to 10 weeks to receive all of the material needed for the rebuild once the order has placed with Aqua Aerobics. Because of this time frame I am asking the Board to consider authorizing this project now that will be a part of the 2015/2016 budget.

# **EVENTS OF SIGNIFICANCE**

### **MDOP**

On March 30, officers responded to four separate reports of Malicious Destruction of Property to vehicles on Lake Pine Drive. A total of six vehicles had their tires slashed with a sharp instrument sometime around 11:30pm the night before. The incidents are under investigation.

### **DRUG OVERDOSE – SUICIDE ATTEMPT**

On March 15, officers were dispatched to a gas station on North Territorial Rd for a report of a teenage male slumped over the wheel of his car. Officers attempted to awaken the subject by pounding on the windows but he was not responsive. Officers forced entry into the vehicle for the subject's safety and were finally able to wake him up, though he was still unresponsive. Officers located some pills, alcohol and marijuana on the subject and relayed this information to HVA, who was on scene treating the subject. He was transported to the hospital for treatment. Officers spoke with family of the subject and were able to ascertain that the subject had attempted to commit suicide.

### **WITNESS TAMPERING**

On March 6, a Northfield detective was notified that an inmate at the jail had, once again, been in contact with the victim in his Domestic Violence case. The inmate had already been charged with two counts of Witness Tampering after the assault, which he pled down to Interfering with a Police Investigation on February 10. Between February 17 and March 1, he had again attempted to contact his victim by phone eighty times. He had also attempted to contact her by letter. Charges have been submitted for additional charges of Witness Tampering.

### **OWI / MINOR IN POSSESSION**


On March 4, officers responded to the report of a vehicle that had been driving erratically on Spencer Rd and ended up in the ditch of the caller's yard. Officers arrived and located four minors near the vehicle. No one would admit to driving the car and told the officer that the driver fled. Eventually one of the females identified one of the males as the driver, who was suspended/expired and had two warrants for his arrest. He failed field sobriety tests and had a BAC of .158. He was arrested for OWI, DWLS and for the warrants. The other male was issued a citation for MIP and had a BAC of .20. One female was issued MIP with a BAC of .12 and the other female was released to an adult and not charged.

## 2014 VS. 2015 Calls for Service







# NUMBER OF TRAFFIC VIOLATIONS BY MONTH 2015 vs. 2014




**TRAFFIC VIOLATIONS ISSUED BY TYPE**

### NORTHFIELD TOWNSHIP FIRE DEPARTMENT STATISTICAL REPORT FOR March 2015

April 14, 2015

#### To The Northfield Township Board of Trustees:

The Northfield Township Fire Department responded to 58 requests for service in March 2015. This is about the same as March 2014 when we responded to 53 requests for service. We are back on average calls for the month.

Of the requests for service, 12 were motor vehicle accidents. There were 20 fire related calls. Of the fire related calls, 4 were mutual aid given structure fires and 3 were Northfield Twp. structure fires, 5 were fire alarms, 1 was a vehicle fire, there were 3 wires down calls and there was 1 elevator rescue. There were 26 medical emergency calls.

Of the responses for the month 46% were in the Hamlet area of the Township, 41% were in the rural areas of the Township, 12% were Mutual Aid outside the township.

Mutual Aid calls for the month: We assisted other agencies 7 times and received assistance 2 times.

The Average response time for the month of March was 6:02.

There were several significant calls for the month of March. We assisted Salem Township with 2 structure fires, Dexter Area Fire with one structure fire and Scio Township with a structure fire. We also rescued 8 high school kids from a stalled elevator at the High School.


- 1. Fire department training March:** Training for the month consisted of Incident Command training, Medical continuing education, Drivers training and pump training.
- 2. EMS/ HVA update:** Trustees Chick, Otto and myself will be attending the HVA open house on April 16<sup>th</sup>. We also have a meeting with HVA management after that open house.
- 3. ISO update:** I have contacted ISO to check to see if our improved fire insurance rating had taken place. I was told that the paperwork has been submitted and the change is in the process. They did not have an answer as to when it will be complete. I will check back monthly. As a reminder this is the initial change from a class 9 to a class 8B. We will be having a full department assessment this summer and hope to improve even more.
- 4. Police Officer Jensen and Pollack update:** As you remember both officers were injured while attempting to remove and then arrest an individual from the pond hockey tournament. Pollack while still in physical therapy for an injured leg is back to work at his full time job. Jensen on the other hand has had to have surgery to repair and injury sustained during the arrest. Jensen will be off 6-9 months. This injury will devastate our overtime and part time budget. I fully expect to have to use money from our fund balance to cover these overages. We have made shift adjustments and are utilizing as much part time help to lessen the impact on these line items. We are attempting to recover costs of this injury not only medical but backfill wages through restitution of the suspect.


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# NORTHFIELD TOWNSHIP GENERAL FUND Revenues Projected vs. Received March 31, 2015 YTD




# NORTHFIELD TOWNSHIP GENERAL FUND Expenditures Projected vs. Incurred March 31, 2015 YTD




## Revenues Projected vs. Received March 31, 2015 YTD




**NORTHFIELD TOWNSHIP

March 31, 2015 YTD**




**NORTHFIELD TOWNSHIP





Managers Report, April 2015

#### Parks and Recreation

We continue to work on the Parks and Recreation Master Plan. We are getting very close to a draft being circulated. I hope once it is released, everyone will see that it was well worth the wait. On the project side, the committee will start to work on the BMX park in more detail.

#### Budget

Internally, Rick and I have begun the budgeting process for the New Fiscal Year. This year, we will be working to integrate a capital improvement plan into our budget process, creating some mechanism to put aside monies for large capital investments. There will be some critical policy decisions to address on how best to do so. Stay tuned.

#### Peoples Express

The Peoples Express contract is back on the agenda. I believe we have worked out an amicable solution for both parties. Most of the explanation is included in the packet memo. Please let me know if you have any questions.

#### Non Motorized Path

We are still awaiting title work to come back for the Non-Motorized path. Once that is complete, we will move forward with easement acquisition and final design. I will keep everyone posted on the details.

#### Upstairs Construction

On the agenda is approval for the construction manager for the board room project. We are at the point that if we move forward, we will incur some costs for architectural and constructional management time. We can still decide not to go forward with the project after it is bid, but there will be some legacy costs associated.

#### Sidewalk Project along Main Street

OHM has been awarded the design / engineering of the project. We will be meeting with OHM and the County Shortly to discuss next steps and how to move the project forward quickly. We are close to having cost estimates, and will provide that to you as soon as possible.

#### Economic Development


We had another request for a liquor license. Unfortunately, we do not have any additional licenses allocated to Northfield Township. While entrepreneurs' can buy them on the open market, that is often costs prohibitive. Brad Maynes and I have been investigating a process to receive additional liquor licenses through the Downtown Development Authority statute. If there are no objections, we will be moving forward with this process. I believe liquor license availability (at a lesser cost then the private market) is a significant driver to growth and development in small downtowns like ours. They allow restaurants and entertainment venues to locate, which provide a destination

for residents and visitors. As part of this process, I would like to begin engaging in a more detailed conversation on how to address the Downtown – and what strategies to put in place for revitalization. Certainly the availability of liquor licenses for restaurants / bars are a good first start.

Whitmore Lake SAD

We have received the critical easement for the Whitmore Lake Sewer Special Assessment District. Unfortunately, we also need a discharge of mortgage from this property owner and are currently trying to track that down. I am assisting the property owner in order to speed this up as fast as possible. I anticipate there being significant progress on this very shortly.

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

Wednesday, April 8th an email was sent indicating that Northfield Township would be assessed ~108,000 (either paid yearly over 10 years or as a lump sum). The Township is being assessed 51% of the project costs. This assessment is being made as there was a determination of public benefit, which was noticed to the Township in December of 2012, prior to me being on board.

Ultimately, the board needs to decide on how they wish to proceed. In order to provide us more time, we will be submitting an appeal (deadline on appeal is this Friday at 5:00 p.m.) to give the board some time to understand the process and decide how to move forward.

A member of the Water Resources Commission staff will be on hand to present at the meeting explaining the project.

**WASHTENAW COUNTY ROAD COMMISSION**  
**2015 LOCAL MATCHING PROGRAM**

The Washtenaw County Road Commission is anticipating it will receive \$17,450,000 in Michigan Transportation Fund (MTF) revenues for 2014. The Road Commission is anticipating the same amount of MTF revenues for 2015.

The Road Commission has recognized that local road funds are inadequate to maintain the 1,064 centerline miles of local roads in Washtenaw County; the Road Commission has historically transferred funds from the Primary Road Fund to the Local Road Fund, even though this transfer severely limits maintenance activity on our primary road system.

A summary of our 2015 budget as approved by the Board of Road Commissioners at its regular meeting on December 2, 2014 (RC14-416) is provided as follows.

**Matching Funds**

The Road Commission has allocated a total of \$500,000 in 2015 for the conventional Local Road Matching Program. This consists of a countywide allocation of \$423,077 for matching programs on local roads in all twenty townships based on the distribution formula used by the Michigan Department of Transportation to allocate local road funds to the 83 counties of Michigan. In addition to this, recognizing the fact that the urban local roads receive a higher allocation of Michigan Transportation Funds, \$76,923 is allocated based on the amount of urban local miles within eligible townships. Ann Arbor, Augusta, Dexter, Lima, Lodi, Northfield, Pittsfield, Salem, Saline, Scio, Superior, Sylvan, Webster, York and Ypsilanti Townships are within the urban area and are eligible for these additional matching funds.

The Road Commission has allocated \$200,000 for the 2015 Drainage Matching Program for local uncurbed, non-subdivision roads. The Road Commission has recognized the need for directing more resources towards improving the drainage along our local roads. The drainage

matching program is in addition to the conventional local road matching program available to the Townships. Some of the key features of drainage matching program include:

- Funding distribution is based on the total uncurbed, non-subdivision local road centerline mileage for each township
- Eligible work activities are limited to uncurbed, non-subdivision local roads
- Eligible work activities include roadside berm removal, ditch establishment & restoration, large culvert or bridge replacement

The WCRC Matching Program is subject to the following conditions:

(a) Township Assistance

In order to allow local road improvements to proceed in a timely manner, townships are asked to assist Road Commission personnel in acquiring necessary tree removal and grading permits, holding public hearings and coordinating any necessary citizen contacts.

(b) Project Overruns

Road Commission staff will provide an estimated cost for each individual project to be included within the agreement between the township and the Road Commission. If, prior to beginning an individual project, it is determined that the original cost estimate will not cover project costs, the Road Commission will notify the township to determine, if the

township desires to proceed with the project with a reduced scope or an additional funding commitment. Budgets are closely monitored on each project and every effort is made to avoid overruns. Any unexpected project cost overrun shall be taken from any unexpended funds remaining in that township's total township agreement. If the overrun exceeds the total township agreement, the Road Commission may bill the township up to an additional 10 percent of the total agreement amount with the township. At the township's option, such overruns can be taken from the following years matching funds.

(c) Billing Procedures

As has been the practice for the past several years, the first 40 percent of the total Matching Program for construction and heavy maintenance projects will be due in June or 30 days from receipt of the first invoice. A second 40 percent will be due in August or 30 days from receipt of the second invoice. A final billing will be due in December or 30 days from receipt of final invoice. Any credits due townships will be returned at the time of final billing or credited to the following year, as determined by the township. The above billing methods apply only to those projects considered to be construction and heavy maintenance and does not apply to those projects considered routine maintenance such as dust control, street sweeping, etc. These will be billed at cost to the date at time of billing.

(d) Administrative Fee

In addition to direct costs, the Washtenaw County Road Commission will charge an 8% administrative fee on all township improvement projects on local roads. The overhead charge is intended to cover costs not directly attributable to the individual project. The administrative fee is not charged for seasonal dust control or work performed by non-road commission crews.

(e) Primary Road Matching

Any township board may, at their option, request that a part or all of their allocated matching WCRC funds, along with an equal amount of township funds, be used on a Primary Road Project within their township boundaries.

(f) Reallocation of Funds

Any township that has not notified the WCRC of their intent to utilize matching funds by May 22, 2015 will forfeit all rights to the use of the matching money. The WCRC will determine the amount of unused matching funds and reallocate these funds to primary road maintenance.

(g) Local Road and Bridge Planning /Engineering Projects

The Road Commission provides planning and engineering services for local road and bridge projects. If the township requests the Road Commission to provide these services, the township is expected to enter into an agreement with the Road Commission to reimburse the Commission for 50% of the cost for these services. Depending on the scope of the project and the amount of matching funds available to a township, these services may be eligible for the matching program.

The Road Commission recognizes that local road bridges are vital assets that require significant resources to maintain and replace. This program fosters a cooperative approach with the Townships, as we partner to renovate or replace deficient bridges.

The Road Commission will continue to provide routine maintenance service and the federally mandated biennial inspections at our expense. Also, we will continue to seek federal grant funding to assist with any major renovation or replacement costs. All costs beyond the grant amounts for major renovation or replacement costs on local bridge projects will be shared equally with the townships. Available local matching funds can be utilized to cover 50% the townships share of a local road bridge project costs.

(h) Shoulder Paving

If a local road is to be paved, the Road Commission will pay the cost of paving the shoulders when it is feasible. The Road Commission has agreed to assume this cost because of the enhanced safety for vehicles and non-motorized travel and reduced maintenance costs inherent in paved shoulders. This provision will not apply to subdivision streets.

(i) Dust Control

*Conventional matching funds can be used for dust control only for solid applications.*

(j) Local Matching Fund Carryover

If a township determines that they desire to carry over the funds allocated for a given year into the following year, the township must provide written notification to the Road Commission that they are requesting this carryover, and identify an eligible project for which the funds will be held. The Road Commission carry-over fund will be preserved for one year. Beyond this point the funds will be reallocated as stated in Paragraph f. The carryover option allows the township to accumulate the funds that are allocated with the previous year allocation; in other words, the carry over funds cannot exceed the previous year's allocation.

WHEREAS, the parties desire to enter into a contract for the purpose of providing law enforcement services and to set forth the terms and conditions and obligations of the parties.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants hereinafter set forth, it is mutually agreed as follows:

1. GPRC will hold three (3) summer picnics during the 2015 season. The picnics will be held on the following dates: June 27, 2015; July 25, 2015; August 29, 2015.
2. The location of these picnics will be 5549 Pontiac Trail, Ann Arbor, Michigan, which is in Northfield Township, Washtenaw County, Michigan and is subject to the jurisdiction of Northfield Township.
3. Northfield Township will provide six (6) uniformed on duty police officers with one (1) being a Command Officer to act as a law enforcement presence for each of the picnics identified above.
4. The officers will be hired and compensated by Northfield Township. Northfield Township shall have the sole and exclusive authority to select the officers to be assigned to this duty. The officers will not be employees or independent contractors of GPRC, but are instead under the direct supervision and control of their employer, Northfield Township.
5. The terms of this agreement will consist of a mutually agreed schedule of officers and supervisors. (Refer to Attachment A)
6. The Township agrees to provide such services at the time and location set forth in the mutually agreed schedule described in paragraph 5 herein, except that, the Police Department and or Command Officers shall have the right to temporarily withdraw said officers from the assignment in the case of an emergency that requires additional police units in some other portion of the Township, or to render aid to other police agencies involved in law enforcement. GPRC shall not be responsible for compensating the Township for the time officers are withdrawn from the detail.

## CONTRACT

This contract is entered into by Northfield Township (hereinafter referred to as Township) and People's Express of 10 Jennings Road, Whitmore Lake, MI, a non-profit corporation (hereinafter referred to as PEX). This contract begins January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2015 and expires December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2015.

### 1. Purpose

The purpose of this contract is to provide transportation assistance to citizens of Northfield Township and provide a system for payment for services by users and to provide a mechanism by which the Township can provide assistance to citizens of Northfield Township who require low-cost transportation.

### 2. Scope and Description of Services

PEX will perform in a timely fashion for the residents of the Township, transportation services with an area shown on Exhibit A to this agreement and made part hereof.

PEX will at all times maintain its equipment in good mechanical condition in conformity with all applicable safety regulations, and will keep all vans and/or buses in clean condition, subject to inspection by the Township at all times. PEX warrants that it now has and will continue to have during the term of this Agreement all necessary licenses, certification, or other documents required by any governmental agency, federal, state, which authorize or permit the operation of a public transportation service, including, but not limited to, inspection and certification by the Michigan Department of Transportation. PEX will provide copies of certificates from

the Michigan Department of Transportation for all vehicles that operate within the Township.

PEX will utilize drivers for this service who are properly qualified and lawfully licensed for the service provided in the vehicles used, and have received appropriate safety training. Drivers shall display proper courtesy toward passengers and maintain a neat and clear appearance.

PEX shall maintain upon its vans and/or buses appropriate signage or markings indicating that the services "People's Express" is to be identified by users of the service. PEX will abide by the policies and statements set forth in this Agreement and this policy shall not be revised without the written consent of the Township.

### 3. Terms of Payment Services

The Township shall pay to PEX the sum of \$10,000.00 annually. With this contract, PEX can leverage an additional \$10,000.00 in federal funds, bringing Township-funded transportation to \$20,000.00 annually. The Ann Arbor Area Transportation Authority (AAATA) has provided 2 grants to PEX. The first grant is for medical rides reserved for seniors or persons with disabilities. The second grant is for anyone going to work. These trips may only go to the Ann Arbor-Ypsilanti Urban Area. The cost for these rides will cost Township residents between \$5 and \$7 each way. There is no cost to the Township for these rides.

### 4. Legal Standing of the Parties

The parties of this Agreement mutually agree that PEX, as of the date of the Agreement, is not a mass transportation authority as provided under Act 55 of 1963 MCLA 5.3475 eq. seq. It is further agreed, that in the event PEX becomes a regional

transportation authority, which expands service to communities bordering the Township with Salem Township, Green Oak Township, Ann Arbor Township, etc., that upon the date of such expansion this Agreement will be renegotiated by the parties to reflect efficiency and reduce the annual costs of the Township by an amount up to twenty (20%) percent dependent upon the size of the Michigan Department of Transportation grant received. In the event the parties are unable to reach a modified agreement, either party may terminate this Agreement upon ninety (90) days notice to the other.

5. Fares Charged to the General Public

The parties agree that PEX shall charge any resident of the Township utilizing its services \$2.00 for each one-way trip within the Township, and no more than \$4.00 per round-trip. Seniors and persons with disabilities will pay \$1.00 each way for service.

6. Unavoidable Delay

In the event of severe weather conditions, road conditions, strikes or conditions totally beyond PEX's reasonable control, PEX shall notify the Township and its appropriate local officials in as much advance as possible of the effect of such conditions on service. PEX shall provide substitute vehicles, which otherwise meet all requirements set forth in this agreement, in the event of mechanical problems or other inability to provide service.

7. Insurance

PEX shall carry and keep in force a comprehensive general liability insurance policy covering the use, maintenance, and operation of \_\_\_\_\_ designated vehicles servicing

the residents of the Township in amounts not less than the following:

Five Million (\$5,000,000.00) Dollars combined single limit of liability for each occurrence for Bodily Injury Liability and Property Damage Liability.

Such policy shall be in a form reviewed and approved by the Township. PEX shall have the Township named as an additionally insured on its policies. PEX, its successors, assigns, officers, directors, employees, and agents shall hold the Township and its employees and legal officials harmless from any liabilities, obligations, losses, damages, claims, or costs, including legal fees and expenses incurred by or asserted against PEX resulting from any of the following:

1. Failure of PEX to operate bus service and conformance with law or this contract;
2. Violation of PEX of any of the provisions of this Agreement;
3. Any act or failure by any officers, director, employee, or agent of PEX; and
4. Any injury to a person, loss of life, or loss of destruction of property rising out of or relating to the operation of this service.

PEX will promptly notify the Township in writing of any claim or liability which PEX believes to be covered under this paragraph. PEX shall properly accept tender of defense in connection with any claim or liability which PEX has herein agreed to identify and the Township shall be kept properly informed of the status of the proceedings and shall properly be furnished with copies of all documents filed or service upon Plaintiff's and shall be furnished in advance with copies of all documents for proposed to be filed and served by his defense counsel. In the event of suit, PEX shall not without first obtaining approval of the Township, settle or compromise any claims, suit, or action proceeding in respect to which PEX has

agreed in writing in the event there is any prospect that the Township shall be named as Defendant or looked to for any payment of any sum arising out of litigation.

PEX hereby waives any and all right to indemnification and subrogation from the Township for any and all claims, and will obtain a waiver of indemnification and subrogation for any and all claims with respect to the Township from its insurance carrier. PEX will provide a copy of both its waiver and its insurance carrier's waiver to the Township.

8. Prohibited Interests

The parties to this Agreement certify that no member, officer, or employee of PEX or the Township, having direct or indirect control over this Agreement, shall, during his/her employment or in tenure with the Township, and two (2) years thereafter, shall have any interest direct or indirect in this Agreement or the proceeds of it.

9. Equal Employment Opportunity

In the event of PEX's violation of Federal or State civil rights laws, or allegations of noncompliance with any civil rights regulation shall permit the Township to void this Agreement, and sanctions or penalties if imposed upon the Township shall be the responsibility of PEX. During the performance of this contract, PEX agrees as follows:

1. That it will not discriminate against any employees or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, ancestry, physical or mental handicap unrelated to ability, or an unfavorable discharge from military service; and further that it will examine all job classifications to determine if minority

persons or women are underutilized and will take appropriate affirmative action to rectify any such underutilization.

2. That if it hires additional employees to perform this contract or any portion of it, it will determine the availability, in accordance with the state law, minorities and women in the area(s) from which it may reasonably recruit and it will hire for each job classification for which employees are hired in such a way that minorities and women are not underutilized.
3. That in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by it or on its behalf, it will state that all applicants will be afforded equal opportunity without discrimination because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, ancestry, physical or mental handicap unrelated to ability, or an unfavorable discharge from military service.
4. That it will send to each labor organization or representative of workers, if bound by a collective bargaining or other agreement or understanding, a notice advising such labor organization or representative of the contractor's obligation under the Department of Human Rights and the Department's Rule and Regulations for the State of Michigan. If any such labor organization or representative fails or refuses to cooperate with the contractor in its efforts to comply with such Act and Rules and Regulations, the contractor will promptly so notify the Department of Human Rights and the contracting agency will recruit employees from other sources when necessary to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement.
5. That it will submit reports as required by the State authorizing, furnish all relevant information as may from time to time be requested and all respects comply with

the Elliot Larson Act, Rules and Regulations of the Equal Opportunity Commission of the Federal Government.

6. That it will permit access to all relevant books, records, accounts, and work sits by personnel of the City or State of Michigan, for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with State law.

10. Independent Contractor.

PEX's relationship with Township under this Agreement is that of independent contractor and not that of employee, partner, or joint venturer. PEX shall be responsible for payment of any and all expenses associated with PEX's activities under this Agreement. PEX shall be responsible for payment of its own federal, state, and local taxes. PEX shall not participate in Township's fringe benefit plans or programs. PEX shall not enter into any agreement or commitment on behalf of Township nor hold itself out as having such authority.

11. Notices

All notices required pursuant to this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be served upon the parties at the address listed in this Agreement. Delivery to an officer authorized to receive notices or the mailing of the notice by registered mail, return receipt requested, shall be sufficient notice.

12. Governing Laws

This Agreement shall be interpreted under and governed by the laws of the State of Michigan.

13. Compliance with Laws

PEX agrees to comply with all applicable statutes, ordinances, and regulations of the United States and State of Michigan, and units of local government.

14. Headings

The section headings of this Agreement are for convenience and reference only and in no way define, limit, or describe the scope of intent of this Agreement.







Communities use many forms of research to decide what they should do and how they should grow. In 2010-2012, Northfield Township used planning fairs, a mailed survey and public hearings that resulted in the master plan approved in July of 2012.

Even the most prescient master plan, though, may not anticipate all the possibilities that development proposals may bring to the table. The plan itself acknowledges that uncertainty, saying "As this Master Plan is being written in 2010-2011, during one of the most difficult economic downturns in the history of the State and nation, many of the previous population and housing projections for this area are uncertain ... A change in the economic forecasts of this region (either up or down) will change the projections and some of the assumptions contained in these pages."

In fact, residential development is booming throughout southeast Michigan. A developer has approached the township to build 800-1,200 units on 460 acres in the primarily agricultural southwest corner of the township and has proposed an amendment to the master plan.

The township's most active and vocal citizens are divided on the merits of the proposal. Its leaders recognize that an objective, quantitative survey of a representative sample of all township residents is the best way to make a decision.

Cobalt Research has conducted research studies for more than 100 municipalities, school districts, institutions and corporations. Our work has enabled communities to make data-driven decisions with confidence.

- When the city of Royal Oak asked voters if they would support a modest tax increase dedicated to maintain and reconstruct local roads, 57 percent of the respondents said "Yes." A November, 2014 vote for up to 2.5 mills for streets was supported by 54 percent of the voters.
- The city of Walla Walla, WA had been unable to pass a package of funding for a municipal pool, although this was a major concern for residents. - Kalamazoo Township's survey showed that residents' top priority was road repair. That gave the township the confidence to request a \$10 million road improvement bond in February 2015, which was approved 935-614.

## TOWNSHIP RESPONSIBILITIES

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There are several areas where Northfield Township is responsible for actionable information.

1. Provide Cobalt with scanned copy of the signed and dated agreement
2. Identify a primary point of contact (project lead) on the township staff  
Provide Cobalt with voter registration or utility billing records in Microsoft Excel or TXT format
3. Provide timely feedback on finalizing scope of services and preferred questions
4. Provide Cobalt with timely revisions of survey instrument and cover letters
5. Provide Cobalt with timely approvals of survey instrument and cover letters
6. Provide Cobalt with a date, time and location of meeting for final presentation of results

## SURVEY METHODOLOGY

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Cobalt recommends administering the questionnaire to a random sample of 1,500 citizens drawn from voter registration or utility billing records. Conducting a random sample of this size allows the township to gather representative and statistically valid data at a lower cost compared to a census. In addition to the random sample, Cobalt also recommends a multi-modal methodology approach by collecting surveys through two waves of a mailed survey along with a URL to complete the survey online. Each randomly selected resident will have a unique identification number to prevent multiple responses from the same resident and to avoid a reminder message to residents who already completed the survey. Deployment and data collection is generally completed within six weeks. Cobalt's response rate for a mail/online combination survey is generally between

25 and 35 percent. The combination of mail and online has proven very effective and provides a higher response rate. Township communication in newsletters and media can increase this response rate.

After the township approves the survey, Cobalt mails an initial copy of the survey with a postage paid envelope. After approximately 10 days, non-respondents receive a second reminder letter with a copy of the survey and postage paid envelope.

Data is coded by industry professionals utilizing current technology and robust quality control to ensure accuracy. Data scrubbing of final results ensures duplicate responses, multiple responses from the same individual and responses from invalid survey ID numbers are removed.

Cobalt proposes a five-step process for the development of the assessment.

**Step 1 – Kick-off Discussions**

Clarify the issues and make sure all relevant voices are heard in developing the objectives of the study. Refine the scope, timeline and key deliverables for the project. Confirm informational needs. The collection methodology will also be finalized during this step.

**Step 2 – Questionnaire Development**

Based on the input received during Step 1, Cobalt and the township will develop questions for the questionnaire which will be presented and discussed with the project lead to ensure that the questions included in the assessment are aligned with organizational needs.

**Step 3 – Assessment Deployment**

Cobalt publishes the assessment in the manner determined by the township (mailings, Eblast, Internet only, phone). The Cobalt team’s public relations consultant will publicize the launch of the survey. Cobalt collects and codes the responses.

**Step 4 – Modeling & Analysis**

Cobalt will analyze the data and develop modeling using Cobalt’s proprietary methodology, which quantifies the relationships between the various elements of the assessment.

**Step 5 – Reporting**

Findings will be communicated to the project lead and other key decision makers in a meeting, with the Township to determine whether that will be at the planning commission or board of directors. A summary report in PowerPoint, detailed cross tabs, and other supporting documents will be provided to the project lead.
